Superintendent Responsibilities:

- 1) Manage the exhibit check-in process, exhibition, and check-out process for their departments.
- 2) Arrange entries/exhibits to the best advantage of the exhibitors, spectators, and judges.
- 3) Review and interpret the rules and exhibition procedures with the department exhibitors, volunteers, and judge(s) before and/or during the exhibition

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All vehicles whose purpose it is to advertise in any way whatsoever shall pay the regular concession privilege rate.
2. Each person or firm selling or delivering merchandise on the grounds will be required to make arrangements with the Secretary.
3. 4-H and FFA families wishing to place campers on the fairgrounds during fair week shall register their camper/vehicle at the County Extension office before June 1.
4. FAIR WEEK EXHIBIT SPACE RENTAL RATES ON GROUNDS: All booths \$100. Excludes food and t-shirt vendors.

Vendors wanting to sell t-shirts or food must complete a separate agreement with additional costs.

5. Any exhibitor making false statements in regard to any animals or articles exhibited, or attempting to interfere with judges in the performance of their duties, by any means, shall be excluded from competing or exhibiting on the grounds of the Association.
6. All exhibitors are expected to be cooperative and courteous. Any action to the contrary may result in the disqualification of the exhibitor, exhibit, and/or participation in the event.
7. Judges shall not consider any article or animal not properly entered and approved by the superintendent(s).
8. Lack of competition shall not be cause for withholding a premium if animal or article is deemed worthy. The judge's decision is final.

GROUNDS REGULATIONS

1. The Fairgrounds police will be sworn in as conservators of the law, and it shall be their duty to arrest any persons creating a disturbance or violating any rules of the Association.
2. No concession may be set up until concession fee, light bill and wiring charge have been paid in full to the Secretary.
3. Any privilege or concession obtained under false representation or does not conform with the applicable laws/ordinances will be revoked by management and any/all money paid for the same will be forfeited to the Association.
4. Soliciting for subscriptions for any newspaper or periodical will not be permitted unless from a space rented from the Association.
5. The management reserves the right to exclude from the grounds any person or persons who may seem undesirable or expel from the grounds such person or persons who shall violate any rules. No objectionable features will be tolerated.
6. Absolutely NO ALCOHOL in barns.
7. No golf carts except for fair board members and fair staff only, unless pre-approved by the fair board.
8. During the Fair, with the exception of the dog show, cat show, pet show, and parade of champions; the only animals allowed on grounds are those that align with the ADA's service animal classification for animals specifically trained to do work or perform tasks for people with disabilities. Animals whose sole function is to provide comfort or emotional support do not qualify as service animals under the ADA and are therefore not allowed on grounds during the Fair. Dogs are allowed in the campgrounds.

USE OF FACILITIES AND TRACK

1. No persons, without authority of the Executive Committee, will be allowed to roll, scrape, drag or otherwise manipulate the track or use it when in a condition by which it may be injured.
2. Persons are strictly prohibited from running horses or vehicles of any kind on the track or any other parts of the grounds during the Fair, except by permission of the Association.
3. No intoxicated person or persons shall be allowed on the grounds any person or persons guilty of disorderly conduct shall be immediately expelled.
4. Bill posting privileges are reserved strictly for the Marion County Fair Association, its officers, agents or employees.
5. The Marion County Fair Association is not responsible for injury to any person or person's property having license privilege to exhibit on its fairgrounds or occupy space thereon. The aforesaid association and its officers shall in no manner be responsible therefore.

OPEN CLASS RULES

1. **All exhibitors must be Marion County residents.** Exhibitors shall carefully consult the fair book and determine what department and which class you wish to enter. Only the official Open Class Entry Form located in the back of this book will be accepted. The Association will not be responsible for incomplete entries.
2. **All entry forms must be entered at the fairground's office on or before July 1, 2025.**
3. Entries must be in place on the grounds at the time designated in the department rules. Use the East door of Dyer Hudson.
4. All entries entered must be exhibited in the proper class and cannot be entered for a premium in two or more different classes.
5. All entries must be entered, baked, or grown in the name of the maker and made since July 1st of the previous year. Culinary entries must be made in a home kitchen and not as a means of livelihood.
6. The Association & management will in no case be responsible for any loss or damage to exhibit entries.
7. **Open class entry/entries may be removed from the fairgrounds beginning Wednesday, July 16th between 2:00PM and 6:00 PM.**
8. In case of protest of an entry or exhibitor, written notice must be given to the superintendent of the department during the day of judging for the article protested and written names of witness must be filed with the superintendent on the same day. The superintendent has the right to disqualify any entry if it is in question as to when the entry was completed or if it has been shown before.
9. No judge will be allowed to judge a class in which he/she has articles on exhibition.
10. Any proposed changes shall be submitted to the secretary by January 1, 2026.

1. All entry forms must be entered at the fairground's office on or before July 1, 2025.
2. **Entries must be in place for displaying with attached entry tags on July 10th (Thursday) between 2:00pm -6:00pm** and remain until the following Wednesday. Use the East door of Dyer Hudson.
3. Photographs and drawings must be matted on sturdy mats. No glass or frames.
4. **Judging will take place Friday at 1:00 p.m.** Entries will be judged on excellence and originality. Entries having no competition will not be awarded a first place premium unless judged worthy of one.
(Note: copyright laws)
5. Amateur exhibitors may not show in the professional class.

Photographs may be monotone or color and may be processed from negatives, slides, digital means or computer manipulation programs. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats, or have matting done professionally. **The minimum size for a photograph entry is 5’x7’ and may not exceed 11’x14’ including the mat.** Framed photos will not be judged.

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DYER-HUDSON BUILDING EXHIBIT RULES

- 1) Exhibitors are limited to members enrolled in Marion County 4-H by May 15 who have completed grades 4-12 or that equivalent. Grade always refers to last grade completed unless otherwise stated. A member becomes ineligible to exhibit upon completion of the calendar year of high school graduation. Members must be: a) grades 4-6 to be in the Junior Section b) grades 7-8 to be in the Intermediate Section c) grades 9-12 to be in the Senior Section.
- 2) 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2025 are eligible to exhibit at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Group exhibits from an entire club may include 4th grade members.
- 3) FFA members are open to bring any project category. FFA projects are not eligible for advancement to state fair through 4-H.
- 4) Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit in a similar department of the FFA divisions or vice versa. See also "4-H Department General Rules & Regulations".
- 5) Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event or competition may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit class.
- 6) Exhibits selected at the county level to advance to Iowa State Fair should not be part of a local auction or sold to another individual before the Iowa State Fair.
- 7) Dyer-Hudson judging will take place on Thursday of fair week, from 9 am to Noon and 1-2:00 pm. Absolutely no exhibits will be accepted, entered, or judged before or after the scheduled time.
- 8) Members should plan to spend some time waiting for judge(s). Members will be evaluated by different judges for the various subject matter areas, or if exhibitor has three or fewer exhibits, may have all exhibits judged by an express-line judge. Fourth graders will have the option to go to the fourth-grade judge and may be judged on up to six items at a time, then will go to the back of the line if they have additional items.
 - a) Members will first take all exhibits to the check-in table (to be sure that entry tags are attached, and the entry form is complete).
 - b) After judging has been completed, members will go to the ribbon table for exhibit ribbons, and then will transfer all exhibits to the proper location in the building.
 - c) The 4-H Exhibit Entry Form is the only copy of the ribbon placings. If this form is lost, premiums will not be paid.
 - d) Cash premiums will be paid at **release time**. Premium money for any exhibits not checked out with authorization to be removed from Dyer-Hudson at official release time will be forfeited.
- 9) Any member who takes an exhibit from the fairgrounds or its display area, prior to release time will be ineligible to exhibit in that Department the following year.
- 10) Exhibit classes are broad categories. To plan exhibits, members are encouraged to use project guides, manuals, and program materials to determine goals and learning experiences. Some project manuals include specific exhibit suggestions and procedures. An exhibit can represent an idea, a part, or all learning involved in the respective project or program. The county Extension office has more information on exhibiting.
- 11) Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright, safety, and approved methods will be disqualified and not put on public display.
- 12) Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H member's participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program.
 1. The 4-H member's goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibitors will receive written evaluation comments on the exhibits and a blue, red, or white Iowa State Fair exhibitor's ribbon. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rubrics for detailed evaluation criteria in each class. Rubrics are located at www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets.
- 13) **Each exhibitor is required to complete a 4-H Exhibit Record for each exhibit**, questions are listed below, or a form is available at the Extension Office. Members using video or cassette tapes as a part of their county fair exhibits should make arrangements with the Extension Office ahead of time to have equipment available or may bring their own equipment. Exhibitors should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:
 - a) **What did you plan to learn or do?**
 - b) **What steps did you take to learn or do this?**
 - c) **What were the most important things you learned as you worked toward your goal(s)?**
 - d) **What would you like to do in this project area next year?**
 - e) **If your exhibit is a Visual Art, Home Improvement, or Clothing exhibit the following needs to be completed: Please identify the design elements/art principles used in the exhibit and how they are used. Check the Marion County Fairbook for requirements.**
 - f) **Copyright logos, designs, or trademark materials should not be used for exhibits on public display at a fair or other setting without written permission. If written permission has been obtained for an exhibit, it should be submitted with the exhibit. See fairbook page 4H-6, rule #18**
 - g) **General Financial Summary**
 - **Example of Exhibit Record on page 4H - 26**

NOTE: Check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for clothing and fashion, home improvement, 4-H poster communication food and nutrition, photography, and visual arts classes.

- 14) The exhibit is to be an outgrowth of work done to accomplish the goal(s) determined by the member or group during the current 4-H year.
- 15) Exhibits may be prepared by an individual member, team of members, or it may be the result of a group effort.
- 16) There is a limit of six (6) exhibits per class unless otherwise noted in department rules.
- 17) Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled with the exhibitor's name and department number. Labels should be placed on the back of posters and cards, and in an inconspicuous place on other items. A completed Marion County Fair entry tag should be securely fastened to the main item in each exhibit on or near the upper right corner or in an easily seen location.
- 18) Marion County Extension will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement, but will not be responsible for damage or loss by fire, theft, etc.
- 19) If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size. (See Classes 10490 and 10530 for smaller requirements.)
 - Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" in depth.
 - 1) Endangered and threatened plants and animals (including insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit. Wildflowers taken from parks should NOT be used. It is illegal to possess songbird feathers or nests. Game animals "legally taken", such as pheasant, goose, duck, or quail, are acceptable.
- 20) Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits.
- 21) The 4-H member's goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design.
 - Exhibitors will receive written evaluation comments on the exhibits and a blue, red, or white Iowa State Fair exhibitor's ribbon. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rubrics for detailed evaluation criteria in each class. Rubrics are located at State Fair Evaluations Forms Labels (<https://iastate.app.box.com/folder/165781615545?s=fuo1u44a07g0psi8w7s-wcerz6dpzjqrn>).
- 22) A written explanation, audio recording, or video recording is to be included as part of each exhibit. Audio or video should not be longer than 10 minutes and must be uploaded to YouTube. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit: • What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)
 - What steps did you take to learn or do this? What were the most important things you learned? NOTE: Check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for clothing and fashion, food and nutrition, home improvement, photography, visual art, and 4-H poster communication and personal development classes.
- 23) Exhibits with a goal that better fits a different department/class will be moved to that department/class, at the discretion of the superintendent of the department. 24.
- 24) **All judges' decisions are final.**
- 25) Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled, including name of the county, exhibitors name, class number and class name.
- 26) No entry fee is required. The exhibit should be selected at a county event. All entries must be made in the name of the county and certified by an Extension staff member.
- 27) **Exhibits which do not comply with guidelines will not be accepted for entry, evaluation, or display at the Marion County Fair.**
- 28) Low-cost exhibits of high quality will be given special recognition.
- 29) STATE FAIR: All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Iowa State Fair General Rules for the exhibit to be eligible for Iowa State Fair exhibition. Exhibits which do not comply with size guidelines, copyright, and safety procedures will not be accepted for entry, evaluation, or display at the Iowa State Fair.
- 30) Exhibits will be awarded premiums of blue, red, and white ribbon quality. Premiums, unless otherwise stated, will be as follows: Blue, \$5.00; Red, \$3.00; White, \$2.00.
- 31) All exhibits must reach the 4-H Exhibits Building by 3:00p.m. on Tuesday, August 5. Counties will be assigned specific dates and times for exhibit delivery. Exceptions: Exhibitors participating in alternative evaluation/educational learning experiences will enter exhibits as determined for program participation
- 32) All exhibits must remain until Sunday, August 17, and must be checked out with the department superintendents before being removed from the 4-H Exhibits Building. RELEASE TIME: 7:00 P.M.- 8:30 P.M. on Sunday, August 17 or 9:00 A.M. - 2:00 P.M. on Monday, August 18. Times and dates are subject to change. All persons picking up (one or more) exhibits must adhere to this schedule and assigned county time.

Other Exhibit Information

1. 4-H members are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibit or part of an exhibit.
2. The Iowa State Fair and Iowa State University Extension and Outreach will use diligence to ensure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after arrival and placement. However, they will not be responsible for damage or loss by accident fire, theft, etc.
3. The Iowa State Fair Management will in no case assume or pay transportation or delivery charges on articles sent for exhibition.
4. Counties will be awarded a pro-rata amount of travel money based on participation and distance from Des Moines instead of exhibit premium money. Distance determination will be based on the established zones as determined by the Iowa State Fair.

Dyer-Hudson Departments & Classes

CLASS DESCRIPTIONS

Most exhibit classes have specific guidelines and requirements that will be included in the judging process. Members are strongly encouraged to go to www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets for information on judging criteria for exhibits that they create from their 4-H project learning.

Department 1 – ANIMALS

Class 10101 – ANIMAL SCIENCE

An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. Ownership of an animal is not required.

Class 20101 - HORSELESS HORSE PROJECTS

- Breed Poster
- Horse First-Aid Kit
- Safety Poster
- Horse Barn Design

Class 10102 - VETERINARY SCIENCE

An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy.

Department 2 – AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES

Class 10210 - CROP PRODUCTION AND PLANT SCIENCE

An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops, plant growth, soils and soil fertility, or any other learning related to crop production and plant science.

Class 10220 -CONSERVATION, ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY

An exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, stewardship, conservation, entomology, fish and wildlife, or forestry. Includes collections.

Class 10230 - HORTICULTURE AND PLANT SCIENCE

An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruits, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Department under 4-H Livestock at the State Fair.)

Vegetables should be prepared and displayed according to 4-H 462, "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit".

Class 10235 – HOME GROUNDS IMPROVEMENT

An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

Class 10222- ENTOMOLOGY –

An exhibit (excluding live specimens) that shows learning or is an outgrowth of an entomology or bee project experience. Includes specimen collections and may include products (ex: honey) or equipment as part of the display.

Class- 10224 FISH AND WILDLIFE –

An exhibit that shows learning about a fish and/or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest, and who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvested. Feral pigs (including Russian/European Boar) are NOT permitted in taxidermy exhibits.

10226- FORESTRY–

An exhibit, including collections, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program.

Class 551A - VEGETABLE CONTAINER DISPLAY

Must include five or more different vegetable crops grown in the exhibitor's home garden. For this class, herbs will count as vegetable crops. More than one variety of any particular vegetable can be displayed; however, not more than four items of the same vegetable can be displayed. For example, four tomatoes would constitute one vegetable, e.g. one large red slicing tomato, one cherry tomato, one yellow tomato, and one processing tomato. The amount of produce exhibited should fit into the container. The vegetables should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4H-462, "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit". Any decorative basket, box, or other decorative container, not larger than one-half bushel in size, can be used. The exhibit will be judged 75% for cultural perfection of the vegetables and 25% for decorative arrangement. For the educational benefit of the public, a file card must accompany the exhibit with each crop clearly labeled as to the variety.

Class 551B - FIRST YEAR EXHIBITOR'S CLASS

Plate of mixed vegetables exhibited by a 4-H member who has never participated in the Marion County Fair 4-H Horticulture Show before. Plate is to consist of one tomato, one onion, one pepper, and two other vegetables of the exhibitor's choice.

Class 551C - HERB COLLECTION

Collection of 4 different herb species (three sprigs each) to be displayed in four separate bottles of water. Specimens should include 3 stems of adequate length to reach the water level. Each herb species should be properly labeled.

Class 551D - JUMBO OR MOST UNUSUAL

Vegetables (one specimen)

Class 551E

Item Constructed from garden produce.

Class 551F - SCARECROW CLASS

Be creative

Class 551G - BUCKET OF FLOWERS

A 5-gallon bucket with flowers that have been grown by the exhibitor with a **card listing the variety of flowers, and light requirements** (sun or shade). This will be judged by the horticulture judge. After judging, all buckets will be placed outside Dyer-Hudson and Bingley Bldg. to enhance the appearance during the fair. Buckets will be sold with proceeds going to County Council activities.

State Fair Horticulture - Entries must be made with the County Extension Office by July 1. Contact the Extension Office for more information.

Horticulture Special Rules:

Members are limited to six exhibits in this department. A member may exhibit no more than three (3) vegetable exhibits and no more than three (3) flower exhibits. In addition to plants, posters, folders, and displays are also appropriate exhibits. Each entry must show variety name. Omitting the variety name may cause lowering of placing.

Class 10240 - OUTDOOR ADVENTURES

An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking or other outdoor activities.

Class 10250 - SAFETY AND EDUCATION IN SHOOTING SPORTS

An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms, or live ammunition. Archery equipment allowed if tips are removed from arrows).

Class 10260 - OTHER AGRICULTURAL AND NATURAL RESOURCES

An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

Agriculture and Natural Resources Special Rule:

1. Exhibits must be ready for display (artwork framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.) or the member must explain how a larger, heavier exhibit will be displayed. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.

Department 3 – CLOTHING EVENT

The following Clothing classes will be judged at Clothing Day on Thursday, June 19, 2025:

***Each member is allowed to exhibit 2 garments per class for Clothing Day.**

General Overview

1. Each youth may only participate in the 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event with one entry in one class per year. Participants may be selected to participate in any one of the four classes, even if they participated in that class in previous years.
2. Each county may send the following number of participants in each class to represent their county, selected from each of the county's events:
 - a. Fashion Revue Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - b. \$20 Challenge Class: Four participants total with no more than one (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - c. Clothing Selection Class: Four participants total with no more than one (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - d. Innovative Design Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
3. The categories in each class are simply for entry limit purposes. All entries in each class will be judged together.
4. Participants must be in the senior 4-H designated level (completed grades 9 – 12 the same year as the event).
5. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as another 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.
6. Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event.
7. Participants should submit only the materials requested for each class (report form and photo – for ALL classes - plus a receipt for \$15 challenge). If additional materials are sent with the entry or brought to the conference judging, they will not be considered.
8. Participant report forms must be uploaded by county staff no later than July 31. Participants should abide by county deadlines for submitting paperwork for entry. Requests for class or group time changes will be honored as availability allows through July 31. Requests made after July 31 cannot be accommodated due to our printing deadlines.
9. A \$30 registration fee is required for each participant entry. Counties will be billed following the Iowa State Fair.
10. All participants must participate in all Awardrobe Clothing Event activities at the times scheduled for their county unless the 4-H member is involved in another Iowa State Fair 4-H activity at the same time with a non-flexible schedule. Pre-approval is required prior to July 31.

Class 511F - CLOTHING SELECTION

Purchased Garment - All members enrolled in the Clothing project area encouraged to participate.

- 1) The purpose of this category is to select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
- 2) Judging is based on fit, color, style, suitability, quality and construction features, stage presentation, required care, and cost comparison.
- 3) There is no consideration in the judging on the amount spent, only in the process of record keeping and reflection on the cost of the individual items as a part of the process.
- 4) Outfits may be purchased at a department store, boutique, online store, sidewalk sales, retail shops or mall stores. Outfits may also be purchased at garage sales or other secondhand venues at any price point. Outfits may be gifts, hand-me-downs, relative or friend's modern or vintage clothing, or existing personal clothing, as long as the 4-H member selected the item as part of this specific outfit for the stated purpose.
- 5) Home-sewn clothing that was not sewn specifically for the participant are acceptable, such as purchases from a used clothing store.
- 6) Premiums: Purple \$15.00; Blue, \$5.00; Participation, \$3.00

Class 511G - \$20 CHALLENGE

All members enrolled in the Clothing project area encouraged to participate.

- 1) This class is designed to expand the 4-H member's shopping experience to shopping venues emphasizing recycling, reducing, and reusing. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, thrift store, secondhand store or similar place.
- 2) Online venues are allowed, must be second-hand in nature. Shipping and handling are not included in the total calculations.
- 3) Traditional shopping venues may not be used, regardless of a low regular or sale price. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts do not qualify for this class.
- 4) Twenty dollars is the purchase price limit including tax. However, some secondhand stores and venues do not typically charge sales tax.

- 5) Receipt(s) for every item included as a part of the calculated total must be submitted with the entry. A garage sale receipt can be a piece of paper with the name of the location such as “Jane Doe garage sale”, date, amount paid, and signature of person selling at the garage sale. If the outfit was free at a garage sale, “free” can be listed on the report form and on the receipt. Failure to provide receipts will be reflected in the evaluation.
- 6) An outfit consists of major clothing pieces such as a shirt and pants or a dress. Shoes, undergarments, and accessories are not included in the \$15 purchase price limit.
- 7) Alterations are permitted to achieve a desired look or fit.
- 8) There are no additional considerations for an outfit that totals less than \$20.
- 9) The outfit pieces should be purchased to meet the 4-H member’s goal or intended use for the purchased outfit, and the 4-H member should have had an experience in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price, and cost comparison.
- 10) Premiums: Purple-\$15.00; Blue, \$5.00; Participation \$3.00.

Innovative Design

1. The purpose of this class is to encourage creativity and out-of-the-box thinking when creating an outfit.
2. These designs can be theatrical costumes, cosplay, wearable technology, sustainable/upcycled fashion, accessible fashion, and/or outfits that use unconventional materials.
3. The outfit must be showcased as a worn garment modeled by the exhibitor or by the individual that it was designed for.
4. Exhibitors may make their garment entirely, or permanently alter the silhouette of pre-existing materials through some method of permanent alteration or addition.
5. Consideration is given to originality and innovation.

Class 511H - FASHION REVUE

Constructed Garment - All members enrolled in the Clothing project are encouraged to participate.

- 1) The purpose of this category is to encourage the construction of a personal garment or outfit.
- 2) Consideration is given to fit, color, style, suitability, quality of construction, stage presentation, and required care.
- 3) Youth participants will model a garment or outfit they constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year.
- 4) A garment or outfit consists of one to three pieces such as, but not limited to, party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear and/or coats.
- 5) Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.
- 6) All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected
- 7) Premiums: Purple \$20.00, Blue Ribbons \$10.00, all other entries \$5.00.

Special Recognition- State Fair

All Awardrobe Clothing Event participants will receive a participation ribbon presented at the public fashion show held at the Iowa State Fair.

The top five (5) entries in each class (Fashion Revue, Clothing Selection, \$20 Challenge, Innovative Design) will receive an award plaque.

Special Recognition will be presented by the Central Iowa Chapter, American Sewing Guild to two individuals who exhibit outstanding sewing skills in the Fashion Revue class.

One inspiring participant selected as one of the top five in the Innovative Design Class who has expressed an interest in furthering their education in fashion design, fashion merchandising, or interior design will be awarded a \$250 scholarship to Des Moines Area Community College’s Fashion Institute.

The Iowa State University Trend Magazine and founding advisor, Ann Thye will present an “On Trend Award” (\$50 gift card) to one participant whose garment incorporates this year’s clothing trends.

The DMACC Fashion Institute Style Award is (Style book and \$50 gift card) awarded to the participant who demonstrates excellence in styling their outfit.

One inspiring participant (must have been selected as top five in class), and who has expressed an interest in furthering their education in textiles and clothing, hospitality management, or event management will be awarded a \$500 scholarship to the Iowa State University College of Human Sciences’ Department of Apparel, Events, and Hospitality Management.

Department 4 – COMMUNICATIONS EVENT

The following classes will be judged at Communications Day on Thursday, June 19, 2025:

This department is open to youth who are participating in the 4-H Youth Development programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

All participants are responsible for reading and complying with the Iowa State Fair Communication Event program rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and specific class rules and regulations.

PURPOSE: The Communication Event Program provides opportunities for 4-H youth to develop their personal communication skills by sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The events provide a series of developmental experiences for different age levels.

No more than two (2) performances from an individual county will be scheduled during a Noon Share-The-Fun show. Limit of two (2) Communications Posters per county.

County premiums: Educational Presentations, Working Exhibits, and Extemporaneous Speaking Premiums:

- 1) Individual - Blue \$8.00, Red \$5.00
- 2) Team -Blue \$12.00, Red \$8.00

Share-The-Fun Premiums:

- 1) Individual & Team - \$8.00

General Communication Event Program Rules And Regulations

1. 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2025 are eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Share-The-Fun and Extemporaneous Speaking - See class rules for age guidelines.
2. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits may be given by one or more 4-H'ers. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be subject to the time limits based on the grade of the member in the highest grade level (i.e. a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader will use the times for the intermediate/senior class).
3. Topics selected by the 4-H'er(s) should be an outgrowth of their 4-H experience(s) or learning in their projects areas. Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
4. Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking participants cannot be involved in another event (communication event, clothing programs, livestock show or judging) during the half-day they are scheduled to participate in their communication event. Share-The-Fun participants cannot be involved in another event from 30 minutes prior to the beginning of the schedule show to 15 minutes following the show. **Participation in multiple activities may not always be possible because of schedule conflicts.**

5. All participants are required to attend the scheduled orientation session prior to participating in their event. (Times subject to change.)

- Educational Presentations: 8:30 a.m. or 1:00 p.m. (August 7-16)
- Working Exhibits: 8:30 a.m. or 1:00 p.m. (August 7-16)
- Share-The-Fun: 20 minutes prior to the show, normally Noon and 5:00 p.m. - times may vary (August 7-16)
- Extemporaneous Speaking: 8:30 a.m. or 1:00 p.m. Monday, August 11/Tuesday, August 12/Thursday, August 14; 8:30 a.m. Sunday, August 17

6. Only presenters are allowed in the Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit and Extemporaneous Speaking preparation rooms.

7. Educational Presentation and Working Exhibit participants will be involved in a “peer evaluation program”.

8. All 4-H Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking participants will receive Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Seals of Merit will be presented to those giving outstanding presentations. Seals of Excellence will be presented to those giving superior presentations. Share-The-Fun participants will receive participation ribbons and a written critique of their performance. Participants are expected to be present for awards given at the close of their event session.

9. Participants in the 4-H Communication Program are expected to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation.

10. 4-H members must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guidelines. Including HS 76 “foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide” found at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434>

11. All participants are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.

12. A \$15.00 fee per entry will be billed to the county. Entries should be selected from a county communication event program.

13. Allocated premiums will be paid to counties for distribution based on the participation in the 4-H Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking opportunities. There will be no premium allocations for Share-The-Fun.

14. Stickers and self-adhesive products are not allowed in the 4-H Exhibits Building. Stickers and self-adhesive products may not be used in any Communication Event for any reason.

15. If live animals will be used as part of Communication Event, the exhibitor must comply with the 2025 Health Requirements for the Exhibition of Livestock, Poultry and Birds at State Fair, District Shows and Exhibitions. This can be found at Animals that do not comply will not be allowed in the 4-H Exhibits Building or on the Iowa State Fairgrounds.

16. Accommodation requests may be made orally and in person, up to the date of the event. However, the timing and manner of a request potentially reduces the Management’s ability to determine a reasonable accommodation. Management requests an Accommodation Request Form be submitted 30 days prior to the event or activity.

Class 811B - EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATION

Purpose: Provide an opportunity for 4-H’ers to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience.

Educational Presentation Rules

1. Time limit: Junior Presentations (5th and 6th grade) must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/Senior Presentations (7th - 12th grade) must not exceed 20 minutes.
2. Participants must turn in a completed Educational Presentation Report form during event check-in.
3. 4-H members may participate in one Educational Presentation per year at the Iowa State Fair.
4. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts of from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified
5. A judge’s critique/conference with each participant will be included.

Class 811C - WORKING EXHIBIT

Purpose: Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

Working Exhibit Rules

- 1) Time limit: All participants/teams will be scheduled for a 30-minute period.
- 2) Participants must turn in a completed Working Exhibit Report form during event check-in.
- 3) 4-H members may participate in one Working Exhibit per year at the Iowa State Fair. Working exhibits will be ranked according to quality to be decided by the judge(s).
- 4) A judge’s critique/conference with each participant will be included.

Class 811E - EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEAKING CONTEST

Purpose: Encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, pre-

pare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

Extemporaneous Speaking Rules

- 1) Participants must be senior 4-H'ers - completed 9th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2025.
- 2) Each county may enter a maximum of two entries; individuals may participate once per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- 3) Program format:
 - a. Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on.
 - The selected topic will not be available to the other participants in the speaker's assigned room. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. The other two topics drawn but not chosen will be returned to the available topics for the other participants.
 - b. A preparation room is to be used with one participant per speaking site admitted initially and one additional participant per speaking site admitted each 15 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader, other adult or any other youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements.
 - c. All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:
 - Participant may bring their own books, magazines or newspaper clippings for reference during the thirty minutes of preparation.
 - Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program).
 - Some relevant reference materials will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.
 - d. Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H'ers own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.
 - e. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
 - f. Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown timecards in an ascending order (1, 2, 3, 4, 5) by the time keeper. "Stop" will be said at six minutes.
 - g. The program timekeeper will introduce each participant by, the county they represent, and read the selected question.
 - H. Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium will not be available.
4. Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:
 - a. Content related to topic.
 - b. Knowledge of the subject.
 - c. Organization of material.
 - d. Power of expression.
 - e. Voice.
 - f. Stage presence.
 - g. General effect.
 - h. Response to questions.
5. A judges' critique/conference is included

Class 811D - SHARE-THE-FUN

Provides 4-H'ers an opportunity to share their skills and talents and to have fun.

1. Eligibility: 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2025. Exception: If the Share-The-Fun act involves a whole club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-The-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair:
 - At least 80 percent of the performing group must have completed 5th through 12th grade in 2025.
 - * Clover Kids are not eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair.
2. Share-The-Fun performances must not exceed six (6) minutes in length.
3. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment will be acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
4. All acts must turn in a completed 4-H Share-The-Fun Report form at event check-in to confirm stage setup, cue music, etc.
5. General judge's comments for the entire show will occur at the Iowa State Fair. No individual conference with the judge will occur.

For State Fair (Fair dates August 7th-17th, 2025)

- 1) Participants must have completed 5th grade.
- 2) Participants cannot be involved in another event such as Clothing Program, Livestock Show, or Livestock Judging during the half-day they are scheduled to participate in the 4-H Communications programs. Marion County participants in the State Fair 4-H Communication event will be scheduled by date availability.
- 3) All participants are required to attend an orientation session at the beginning of the half day they are scheduled to give their Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, Share-the-Fun act, or Extemporaneous Speech.
- 4) Working Exhibits given at State Fair by Juniors (grades 5-6) will be scheduled for 25 minutes- Those given by Intermediates and Seniors (grades 7-12) will be scheduled for 45 minutes.
- 5) Only presenters are allowed in the Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking preparation rooms.
- 6) All 4-H participants in Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits will be given Certificates of Recognition. Seals of Merit will be presented to those giving outstanding presentations. Seals of Excellence will be presented to those giving superior presentations. Participation ribbons will be given to all Share-The-Fun participants.
- 7) 4-H'ers giving Educational Presentations, Working Exhibits, and Extemporaneous Speech will receive an Iowa State Fair 4-H T-shirt that they are encouraged to wear while presenting. However, if clothing contributes to the topic being presented, such as wearing a bee-keeper's outfit while doing a presentation on raising bees, this is acceptable and appropriate.

Department 5 – CRAFT-KITS, & PATTERNS

(Not eligible for State Fair)

Class 201A - Limited to 3 exhibits per member

Articles made from kits or pre-formed molds will be accepted in this class. Exhibits made from patterns in general fit into this class. Some traditional patterns, such as quilt patterns, where design decisions are evident will fit into the Visual Arts class for Original Art.

Department 6 - CREATIVE ARTS

Class 10310 - MUSIC

An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history.

Class 10320 - PHOTOGRAPHY

An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

Photography Special Rules:

- 1) Photographs may be either black and white or color. Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
- 2) Photographs must be a minimum of 5 inches by 7 inches. Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs may not exceed 11 inches by 14 inches. Square photos are allowed within the following dimensions, measured by inches: 7x7, 8x8, 9x9, 10x10, 11x11. Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 11 inches high by 24 inches in length.
- 3) All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted. Maximum thickness of finished project must not exceed 1/2" thick.
- 4) Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats, or have matting done professionally.
 - 4-H members are responsible for design decisions such as mounting, matting, color, and size.
 - Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.
- 5) A series is a group of photographs [3 to 5] that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Slides should be numbered. *Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 8 inches by 8 inches.*
- 6) Edited photos should include a copy of the photo before edits.
- 7) Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
- 8) Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
- 9) There is a limit of five (5) individual photos per member and a limit of three (3) series of photos; this includes photos entered electronically in class 10303.
- 10) Iowa State Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the most current Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits.
- 11) Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography Show and vice versa.

Class 10340 - CREATIVE PHOTOGRAPHY

A photographic image that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative, and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple photographs.

Creative Photography Special Rules:

1. Photograph/image may be mounted/matted or submitted (uploaded) as a digital image.
2. If mounted, photograph/image must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4" in length or larger than 14" in length.
3. Photograph/Image can be digitally created or from a film negative.
4. Exhibit must have the most current Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Exhibit write up should include additional information about the processes and decisions used to develop exhibit.
5. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

Class 10345 – PHOTOGRAPHY IDEA/EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class This class may include educational displays about printing, processing, editing, marketing, branding, merchandising, etc., as it relates to photography..

Class 10350 Visual Arts – this class will now be divided into three classes:

10350 Visual Arts - Original Art

10355 Visual Arts – Design, Process, or Technique Exploration

10360 Visual Arts – Other Visual Art Ideas/Topics

10350 VISUAL ARTS - ORIGINAL ART-

An exhibit that showcases the skills you have developed in one or more mediums. Original art is a one of a kind, non-replicable design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another's work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) and art principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art.

10355 VISUAL ARTS – DESIGN, PROCESS, OR TECHNIQUE EXPLORATION — This class emphasizes process and provides an opportunity to explore a medium, practice a skill, or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. This class is for experimenting with and practicing skills in different mediums. An explanation of the application of design elements or art principles used when making the exhibit **must be included**. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found, any pictures, sketches, etc.) must be credited, acknowledged or have copyright permission obtained. See visual arts special rule #5 and #6

10360 VISUAL ARTS – OTHER VISUAL ART IDEAS/TOPICS — Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business or marketing process, planning group tour, career options, etc.

Visual Arts Special Rules:

- 1) Exhibits must be ready for display (artwork framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.) or the members must explain how a larger, heavier exhibit will be displayed. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- 2) Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, white-ware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
- 3) If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source of inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included. For additional information, see the Visual Arts and Design Elements & Art Principles Exhibit Tip Sheets at www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets.
- 4) Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
- 5) Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H'er is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. For additional information, see 4-H Exhibit Copyright Information at <http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects/visualart.htm>

Department 7 - FAMILY AND CONSUMER SCIENCE**Class 10410 - CHILD DEVELOPMENT**

An exhibit that shows learning about children. Exhibits that include items intended for use with children (books, toys, learning games, babysitting kits, etc.) should include information about what you have learned 1) about children while creating and using the exhibit or 2) what the child(ren) learned from use of the item(s) in the exhibit. Exhibit examples include careers in child development, caring for children with special needs, childcare, growth and development, safety and health, etc.

Class 10420 - CLOTHING AND FASHION – Constructed/Sewn Garments & Accessories

A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

Class 10422 - CLOTHING AND FASHION – Purchased Garments & Accessories

Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

Class 10424 – CLOTHING AND FASHION – Other Ideas/ Educational Exhibits

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc.

Clothing and Fashion Special Rules:

1. *Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.*
2. *Exhibits in classes 10420 and 10422 must include information about application of design elements and art principles. Exhibits in class 10424 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.*

Class 10430 - CONSUMER MANAGEMENT

An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, or consumer rights and responsibilities.

Class 10440 - FOOD AND NUTRITION – Prepared and Preserved Product

An exhibit of a prepared or preserved food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, safety practices, or food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. See HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding preserved food products.

Display boxes are not allowed for prepared products at the Iowa State Fair

Class 10445 – FOOD AND NUTRITION – Educational Display

An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows that skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, meal planning/preparation & service, safety practices, or food preservation. See HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. Exhibits showing learning about meal planning and service must include a menu.

Food & Nutrition Special Rules:

1. Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.
2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
3. Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked, or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.
5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
6. The recipe must be included for any prepared or preserved food exhibit, including the source of the recipe.
7. Preserved foods must include the Preserved Food 4-H Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2024, is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used. Processed honey must include the Honey Label for 4-H Exhibits.
8. Preserved foods exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a re-closable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag. Recommended number of items to include with the exhibit: Cookies, cupcakes, bars, muffins, rolls, etc. – four (4) to six (6) items Cakes, loafs, pies, etc. – one (1) whole product
10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

Class 10450 - HEALTH

An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, safe activities and skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and/or healthy lifestyle choices.

Class 10460 - HOME IMPROVEMENT

An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving and caring for your home living space. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items.

Home Improvement Special Rule

1. Exhibits must be ready for display (artwork framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.) or the member must explain how a larger, heavier exhibit will be displayed. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
2. Exhibit write-up/information must include source of inspiration and/or references indicating where the idea or information was obtained, giving credit to original author(s)/designer(s)/artist(s).

Class 10470 - SEWING AND NEEDLE ARTS – Constructed Item

A constructed item (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcase, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, or other items. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

Class 10472 – SEWING AND NEEDLE ARTS – Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers etc.

Class 10480 - OTHER FAMILY AND CONSUMER SCIENCE

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any other Family & Consumer Science class listed.

Special Exhibition - Thrifty Meal Challenge**Class 10490 - Thrifty Meal Challenge–**

Create a balanced, nutritious meal for family of four (4) that includes a serving from each of the five food groups with a budget of \$11. (the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefit allowance as of October 2024.)

Special Rules:

1. Each county may enter one (1) exhibit in this class to the Iowa State Fair
2. All entries will receive an evaluation and ribbon.
3. Exhibit may be from an individual or group effort.
4. The total expense on receipt(s) must not exceed \$11.
5. The meal must serve four (4) people, with a serving for each person from each of the five(5) food groups: Fruit, Vegetable, Protein, Grain, and Dairy.
 - A) Recommended portion sizes per person: ½ cup fruit, ½ cup vegetable, 2-3 ounces protein, 1-2 ounces grain, 1 cup equivalent dairy.
 - B) If there is a dairy allergy, you may substitute it with a calcium rich item, but you will need to indicate the allergy and identify how the substituted provides enough calcium.
6. The exhibit will be a poster (maximum size 20" x 30") that includes:
 - a. The menu, a list of food items, and appropriate portion sizes for each food item.
 - b. Meal type (breakfast, lunch, or dinner).
 - c. Copy of grocery receipts (up to 2).
 - d. Photos of the experience: grocery shopping, food preparation, and prepared meal.
 - e. The completed Thrifty Meal Challenge Worksheet attached to the back of the poster.
 - f. Failure to include the above documentation or adding a folder or binder will drop the exhibit one ribbon placing.

Department 8 – PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT**Class 10510 – CITIZENSHIP**

An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country or your world.

Class 10520 – COMMUNICATION

An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills. Includes learning from participation in

Theatre Arts projects or programs such as puppets, stage design, etc. May include original creative writing, poetry, fiction, non-fiction, etc.

Class 10530 - COMMUNICATIONS POSTER

4-H Poster Communication Exhibit – Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- 4-H is . . . (open to 4-H members interpretation)
- Join 4-H
- Beyond Ready in 4-H (2024 National 4-H Week theme)
- Lasso Your 4-H Legacy (variation of 2025 Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme)
- 4-H Sweet 4-H (variation of 2025 Iowa State Fair theme)

Poster Communication Special Rules:

1. Only one (1) poster per 4-H member may be entered. Limit of two posters per county.
2. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board: size minimum of 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22".
3. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage, digital images, etc. If digital images or a computer program is used to create the finished poster, the member needs to cite their sources on the Poster Exhibit Entry Form.
4. Posters **cannot** be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may **not** extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
5. Each poster **must** have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
6. Posters **cannot** use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
7. 4-H members may include the 4-H clover in the poster.
8. All 4-H Communication Posters will receive Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Outstanding posters will receive Seals of Merit. Superior posters will receive Seals of Excellence

Class 10540 - DIGITAL STORYTELLING

An exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

Class 10550 – LEADERSHIP

An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

Class 10560 - SELF-DETERMINED

An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

Department 9 – Science, Engineering & Technology

Class 10610 - MECHANICS

An exhibit that shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions or that involve a combination of skills.

Class 10612 – AUTOMOTIVE

Repaired or restored vehicle . **(Note: vehicles will be on display at the Iowa State Fair one day only, tentatively Thursday, August 7.)**

Class 10613 Automotive Educational Display

An exhibit that shows learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems

Class 10614 – ELECTRIC

Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources safety, etc.

Class 10615 – SMALL ENGINE

Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-carts, etc.

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Class 10616 – TRACTOR

Repaired or restored tractor . Note: A conference judging opportunity for exhibitors of repaired or restored tractors in Class 10616 will be offered during exhibit check-in. (Conference judging may not be available during all check-in times.) Tractors will be displayed outside throughout the Iowa State Fair. Release time Sunday, August 17, after 7 p.m. Please bring chocks for back tires of tractor.

10617 Tractor Educational Display

An exhibit that shows learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety.

Class 10618 – WELDING

Constructed item or educational display that shows skill or learning about welding.

Class 10620 - WOODWORKING

An exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.

Class 10603 – SCIENCE, ENGINEERING & TECHNOLOGY

An exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include aerospace, biological and chemical sciences, computers & networking, earth & climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), robotics, or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology.

10632 Aerospace – Educational display or other exhibit (including flyable models) showing learning about an aerospace idea or topic.

10634 Robotics - Educational display or other exhibit (including working robots) showing learning about robotics and robotic systems.

Science, Engineering, and Technology Special Rule:

1. Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering, and Technology classes are not eligible to exhibit in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice versa.
2. Exhibits must be ready for display (artwork framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.) or the member must explain how a larger, heavier exhibit will be displayed. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.

Special Recognition at the Iowa State Fair

The Iowa 4-H Foundation provides the Judge's Choice purple rosettes. Each judge awards one exhibit as having exceeded the standards expected of a blue ribbon.

The ISU College of Liberal Arts and Sciences recognizes outstanding and innovative exhibits that fall within the college's majors. Recipients will be awarded a certificate and scholarship to the college.

The ISU College of Agriculture and Life Sciences recognizes outstanding and innovative exhibits that fall within the college's majors. Recipients will be awarded a certificate and scholarship to the college.

The ISU College of Health and Human Sciences recognizes outstanding and innovative exhibits that fall within the college's majors. Recipients will be awarded a certificate and scholarship to the college.

The ISU Department of Industrial and Manufacturing Systems Engineering recognizes outstanding and innovative exhibits that demonstrate excellent industrial engineering principles. Recipients will be awarded a certificate and scholarship to the department.

The Iowa Questers Preservation and Restoration Special Recognition recognizes three 4-H members for their exhibits showcasing the preservation and restoration of a family heirloom or of an item of historical significance. The member must explain the working steps done, research done on the item regarding its history, and what they intend to do with the item; all this information should be included in their write-up. Recipients will be awarded a certificate and a gold, silver, or bronze medal, along with a monetary donation made in their name to a museum or historical society of their choice.

The International Harvester (IH) Collector's Club Chapter 5 recognizes 4-H members who restore International Harvester tractors, farm equipment, stationary engines, Cub Cadet tractors, and/or utilize IH branded items in their exhibit. 4-H members must apply, with final selection of awards determined by the IH Collector's Club Chapter 5. Recipients receive a monetary award, certificate, and one- year membership to the club.

The Professional Photographers of Iowa Gallery Award recognizes up to 20 of the best 4-H photographs. Recipients receive a medallion and certificate.

The 4-H Innovation Award, presented by Praxidyn, recognizes one 4-H member for their innovation, engineering, learning, and perseverance. The recipient will receive a certificate and scholarship from Doug and Kathy Applegate.

ACCOMODATING YOUTH WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Youth with special needs may require help in order to be fully included in the variety of programs available. Individuals who need modifications should contact the Marion County Extension Office at least two weeks prior to the fair. A plan will be developed to meet the needs of the individual.

GENERAL RULES

1. **All exhibitors are responsible for reading and understanding fair department rules before making entries.**
2. Exhibitors should wear appropriate dress while in the show ring. This consists of official show 4-H/FFA T-shirt, dark blue jeans, and protective footwear (no sandals or sneakers). Horse and Dairy Show attire is listed with those departments.
3. All exhibitors are expected to be cooperative, courteous, and good 4-H representatives, both in the ring and in the barns. They are also expected to treat their animals in a humane manner. Any action to the contrary may result in the disqualification of the exhibitor, exhibit, prizes, premiums, and/or participation in the event.
4. **All livestock exhibit entries must be made through FairEntry by 11:59 p.m. June 15th.**
 1. Any situation relative to 4-H Club and FFA exhibits not covered in the rules or in case of conflict or misunderstanding, final authority for interpretation rests with a board made up of a member of the Fair Committee, member of the County Extension Council, one FFA advisor, one County Extension staff member, and a superintendent of the division in which the dispute arises.
 2. All Marion County 4-H and FFA members who have completed grades 4-12 are eligible to exhibit providing member cared for project a majority of the time. A member becomes ineligible to exhibit upon completion of the calendar year of high school graduation or equivalent. **Any time "grade" is stated in connection with a class, it means "last grade completed".**
 3. The following statement is taken from a Statement on Relationship between Iowa State University Extension Service and Iowa Public School Vocation Agriculture Program August 28, 1968, and will apply to Marion County: "Eligible youth may be members of either or both the 4-H and FFA. Separate projects shall be planned and conducted by the members of each group. The persons supervising the work are encouraged to plan projects and programs that will supplement each other in the broad development of the individual."
Livestock may NOT be identified as both a 4-H project and an FFA project.
 4. In case of sickness, an exhibitor may select a Marion County 4-H/FFA member of eligible age to show his/her exhibit. **Substitution must be approved by the superintendent.** Same applies to exhibitors called into the armed forces. All showmanship exhibitors must show their own animals.
 5. During the Fair, with the exception of the dog show, cat show, pet show, and parade of champions; the only animals allowed on grounds are those that align with the ADA's service animal classification for animals specifically trained to do work or perform tasks for people with disabilities. Animals whose sole function is to provide comfort or emotional support do not qualify as service animals under the ADA and are therefore not allowed on grounds during the Fair. Dogs are allowed in the campgrounds.
 6. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects, color, or conformation in exhibiting animals such as lifting or filling under the skin (no false tail heads), adding hair or twine, and artificial filling/drenching will be considered as fraudulent deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition at the Marion County Fair. The decision of the official fair veterinarian is final.
 7. Exhibitors wishing to withdraw any animal on account of sickness must have approval of fair vet
 8. Any animal taken from its pen/stall before the scheduled release time during fair week without receiving specific permission from the superintendent(s) beforehand. ANY EXHIBITOR NOT COMPLYING WITH THIS RULE WILL RECEIVE NO PREMIUM AND THE EXHIBITOR MAY BE INELIGIBLE TO SHOW THE FOLLOWING YEAR.
9. **ALL EXHIBITORS SHALL REVIEW FAIR PROGRAM SCHEDULE FOR ARRIVAL, CHECK-IN AND RELEASE TIMES.**
10. Any flagrant abuse of over-entries can cause forfeiting of right to show.
11. In cases where there are few entries within a class, livestock judges reserve the right to make placings in accordance with the merit of the animal or animals concerned.
12. Numbers will be issued to each exhibitor. **Number is to be worn by exhibitor** for ease of identification and uniform appearance.
13. Any concerns or complaints over a project to be exhibited should be addressed to the Marion County Extension Office by June 30.
14. Sawdust bedding is provided by the Fair Committee to all barns. Used bedding must be disposed of in designated containers prior to leaving the grounds.
15. All fans must have protective screens and safe wiring and NOT be free-standing.
16. All animal unloading in the East/West facing barns must happen on the west. No vehicle access on the east side of barn
17. All livestock trailers must be removed from the Fairgrounds once unloaded and moved to Old Pamida
18. All Tents must have two sides open at all times.
19. NO generators can be used around the Poultry/Rabbit Barn.
20. You can set up 8PM day before your show day on the north side of the goat barn but must tear down by 8pm after the show is completed.

LIVESTOCK SALE

1. All eligible market livestock (meat goats, swine, beef, and sheep) must be signed up in Extension Office BY 2:30 P.M. Monday of Fair Week. The sale will be posted and families will have 24 hours to make changes if needed. After the 24 hours, there will be no changes made. If you are not on the sale list, you will NOT sell. All exhibitors are responsible for their animals' care before, during, and after the Livestock Sale until safely loaded on the buyer's truck.
2. Only market beef animals gaining at least 2 lbs./day are eligible for the sale. All swine not going to slaughter are subject to rule #6 of Health Requirements.
1. Please be helpful and cooperate with your Department Superintendents, Sale Officials, and Livestock Buyers. Sale officials may post additional requirements. As a seller of livestock, you should be prepared to bring your animals promptly to the Sale Ring, present them for auction, and return them to their pen/stall or other location designated by the superintendents.
2. All non-sale pigs MUST be removed from the barn on Wednesday evening 30 minutes after parade of champions.
3. **Sale order for 2024 is Poultry, Rabbit, Beef, Swine, Sheep & Goats**

2025 HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, AND BIRDS AT COUNTY 4-H/FFA FAIRS

See additional rules in department rules

1. **ANY EVIDENCE OF WARTS, RINGWORM, FOOT ROT, PINK EYE, DRAINING ABSCESSSES OR ANY OTHER CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS CONDITION WILL ELIMINATE THE ANIMAL FROM THE SHOW.**
2. No individual Certificate of Veterinary Inspection will be required on Iowa origin animals or poultry exhibited at County 4-H/FFA FAIR, but the animals must be inspected when unloaded or shortly thereafter by an accredited veterinarian. All animals moving from out of state into an Iowa county 4H/FFA fair must meet Iowa Animal and Livestock Importation requirements. Each show must have an official veterinarian.
3. Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.
4. **Swine:** All Swine must originate from a herd or area not under quarantine and must be individually identified. All Swine are requiring to have individual official identification. All 4-H and FFA tags bearing the US Shield are official identification tags. Swine originating outside of Iowa- All Exhibitors must present a test record and certificate of veterinary inspection that indicates that each swine has had a negative test for pseudorabies within 3- days prior to the show, regardless of the status of the herd, and show individual official identification on test report. Electronic identification will not be considered official identification for exhibition purposes.
5. Swine exhibitors at county fairs that do not require a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, must sign and present an owner affidavit that the animals being exhibited did not originate from a quarantined herd and to the best of their knowledge; swine dysentery has not been in evidence in their herd for the past 12 months.
6. All swine exhibited must be accompanied by a record of a negative pseudorabies test, the test having been performed within 30 days prior to show, for swine originating from a Stage 4 or lower status county, subject to 64.35(2). No pseudorabies testing is required for swine originating from a Stage 5 county (Iowa is Stage 5).
7. Swine returning from an exhibition to its home herd or moved to a purchaser's herd, following an exhibition or consignment sale, must be isolated and retested negative for pseudorabies not less than 30 days and not more than 60 days after reaching the swine's destination. (Code of Iowa 166D.13(2))
8. **EXCEPTIONS:**
 - A. No testing is required for swine at an exhibition that involves only market classes, provided all swine are consigned directly to a slaughter establishment from the exhibition. The site that the swine originate from must have a current monitored status in order for the swine to be transported to the fairgrounds (statistical testing completed within the last twelve months or originate from a site in Stage III or higher area). Swine leaving the exhibition from a market class must be consigned and moved direct to a slaughtering establishment.
 - B. If counties have a split show and the breeding animals are exhibited and returned home before the market classes arrive, it will not be necessary to have a test record on the animals showing in the market classes; however, market class animals must have a current monitored status in order to be transported to the fairgrounds.
9. **SHEEP AND GOATS** - All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag. All sexually intact goats must be identified with an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag or by an official tattoo registered with USDA (to register, call 1-866-USDA-TAG; 1-866-873-2824).

10. **POULTRY AND BIRDS** - All poultry exhibited must come from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days of public exhibition and the test must have been performed by an authorized tested. (SEE GENGERAL SECTION 1.B) **Please note: Poultry purchased from a hatchery and raised for exhibition are not exempt from PullorumTyphoid testing requirements.**
11. However, "Market Classes" of poultry consigned to a slaughter establishment are exempt from the Salmonella testing requirements. "Market Classes" of poultry must be separated from all other poultry by a distance of ten or more feet and/or an eight-foot high solid partition.
12. **DOGS AND CATS** - All dogs and cats exhibited must have a current rabies vaccination certificate.
13. **FARM DEER** - "Cervidae" means all animals belonging to the cervidae family, and "CWD susceptible cervidae" means whitetail deer, blacktail deer, mule deer, red deer, elk and moose. Cervidae may be exhibited without other testing requirements when accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that lists individual official identification.
14. All Cervidae must have been part of the herd of origin for at least one year or were natural additions, or must have originated from a chronic wasting disease monitored or certified herd in which these animals have been kept for at least one year or were natural additions. Cervidae originating from a herd with a diagnosis, signs, epidemiological evidence, or area under quarantine for chronic wasting disease may not be exhibited. The following statement must appear on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:
 - A. CWD susceptible cervidae: "All Cervidae on this certificate originate from a chronic wasting disease monitored or certified herd in which these animals have been kept for at least one year or were natural additions. There has been no diagnosis, signs, or epidemiological evidence of chronic wasting disease in this herd for the past year."
15. THE DECISION OF THE OFFICIAL SHOW VETERINARIAN WILL BE FINAL.

General Beef Rules

1. Free standing fans will not be allowed. Hanging fans will only be allowed when attached to the tie rails or to supports attached to the tie rails. No fans will be allowed to blow from behind an animal regardless of attachment or location. All fans will blow on the non-show side of the animal (Left Side).
2. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects, color, or conformation in exhibiting animals such as lifting or filling under the skin (no false tail heads), adding hair or twine, and artificial filling/drenching will be considered as fraudulent deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition at the Marion County Fair. The decision of the official fair veterinarian, is final.
3. All Cattle must be removed from Tie outs by 8am on sale day (Thursday).
4. **Only those with an average daily gain of at least 2.0 pounds or weighing at least 1000 lbs will be allowed to sell in the livestock auction.**
5. All market beef must have been born January 1-December 31, last calendar year.
6. County-Raised Market champion and Reserve Champion will be selected from those animals in the grand champion market class
7. If you are not at the show arena and ready to go in by 3rd call, you will miss your class. There will be no more holding the show.
8. Bedding will be spread out in tie-outs. Families can choose to bring in more bedding after tie out spots are assigned.

Beef Showmanship

- All showmanship participants are eligible to compete for the trophies within their groups – 1st Year Showmanship, Junior (Gr. 4-6), Intermediate (Gr. 7-8), and Senior (Gr. 9-12).
- Showmanship exhibitors compete on a voluntary basis and no selection process is followed; fitting of the calf is optional. Exhibitors may win each age group of showmanship only once

Department 50 - Breeding Beef

Cow-Calf Rules

9. Exhibitors will display the calf birth date and the exhibitor number while showing.
10. Classes may be divided into British breed or Exotic breed and shown as two-year-old cows or as mature cows (3 years old and older). Age is based on a calendar year.
11. A minimum of four cow-calf entries are needed to divide classes.
12. **To be eligible for the prospect calf class, the calf must have been born after January 1 of the current year.**
13. Cow-calf pairs are not eligible for Overall Breeding Heifer award.
14. Cow-calf pairs will be allowed a 10x10 fenced area in the tie-out area. Pen to be provided by exhibitor.

Breeding Heifer Rules

1. All exhibitors will check-in at the scales in the Cattle Barn (see Fair Program Schedule for time) to verify birth date and tattoos and have pedigree papers in hand. Exhibitors must be available with papers in hand to be eligible to show.
2. All Breeding Heifers (including Commercial/ Crossbred heifers) must have a legible tattoo.
3. Exhibitors will display the heifer birth date and the exhibitor number while showing.
4. Crossbred heifers will show in a Commercial Class. All heifers must be identified by a legible tattoo and birthday corresponding to the Livestock Identification Form, and be born during the preceding calendar year, inclusive. Any animal unable to meet the above requirements will show in crossbred class.
5. All purebred heifers must be registered, and all breed requirements will follow the IJBBA classifications. Registration papers must be in the 4-H'ers name OR show a logical family relationship. Any animal unable to meet the above requirements will show in crossbred class.
6. Breeding heifer entries must be born after September 1st of two calendar years prior to current year and by December 31st of the last calendar year.
7. All heifers will be judged from the standpoint of breed characteristics: type, quality, and conformation with future usefulness as a breeding cow consideration.

8. There will be a limit of 3 heifers per exhibitor.
9. Superintendents have the discretion to combine or divide heifer classes.
10. Three registered heifers of a recognized IJBBA breed are required to add a class.
11. New Bred & Owned Division
 - a. At check in exhibitors must designate the animal for eligibility and all registration papers must be present to superintendent to be check for appropriate documentation that states the animal was bred by and currently owned by the Exhibitor.
 - b. After completion of each breed champion the selection of a champion and reserve champion bred and owned for each breed will be named based on highest placing in each class for that breed.

1. Exhibitors will display the average daily gain and the exhibitor number while showing.
2. Each exhibitor is limited to a **maximum of three market beef animals (steers and/or heifers)**.

6. All calves must be stalled in the barn or place designated by Superintendent.
7. Market Steers shall be shown by weight and not by age.
8. All Market Heifer breeds and crossbreds will be shown together.
9. Market heifers are ineligible to show as Breeding Heifers.
10. All crossbred calves will show in a Crossbred class. There will be a Lightweight, a Mediumweight, and a Heavyweight division.
11. Market Steer classes will be designated by Superintendents for benefit of exhibitors.
12. Prior to the Showmanship Classes, the top 5 Carcass winners will be announced.
13. All registered steers must have legible tattoos. Steers without legible tattoos will show in a crossbred class. Registration papers must be in the 4-H'ers name OR show a logical family relationship. Member must have papers in hand at check-in.
14. **Grand Champion and Res. Champion Market Heifers will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Market Beef.**

15. The top five animals will be recognized in the grand champion market class.

Carcass scanning will be held Saturday, July 12th, 9am at the Marion County Fairgrounds. All animals competing in the Market Beef Show will be ultrasound scanned at the fair. Animals will NOT be clipped. Vegetable oil will be applied to the hide of all entries. Corn starch is recommended to help remove oil prior to the show.

1. Animals must be weighed and identified at a 4-H weigh-in. By February 1st 4-Hers must enter the information into 4H Online for the animals that they weighed in.
2. All Exhibitors must read and understand the Iowa Youth Code of Ethics.
3. Exhibitor will be allowed a maximum of 3 entries in the Carcass Class.
4. The class will be judged based on carcass ultrasound information and rate of gain.
5. All animals entering this class must be reasonably clean and DRY at the time of ultrasound. Any animals that are wet or mud/manure-covered will not be allowed to participate.
6. All Animals need to be halter broke.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. See General Rules and Health Requirements section of the fair book.
2. Any breed of dog may be shown.
3. Exhibitors must be a 3rd year trainer before they can train a second dog.
4. All dogs must have a rabies certificate turned in to dog project leader at the first practice. It is recommended that the dog also have a distemper immunization, either temporary or permanent.
5. All dogs must be on a leash unless being directed by youth and leaders during workouts and stay out of livestock barns.
6. Dogs must be a minimum age of 6 months as of May 1st of current year.
7. Dogs showing aggressive behavior will be evaluated at the superintendents' discretion in an effort to ensure a safe environment for all dogs, members and volunteers.
8. Must wear closed toed shoes at practice and show day.
9. Females in season cannot be shown
10. Dog Exhibitors are responsible for clearing up after their dog while on the fairgrounds.
 12. Dogs are to return home after the show.
 13. Dogs and handlers who score 85% in a class must move to the next class the following year.
 14. Superintendents have final call on class placements.
 15. Youth must care for, train and handle the dog.
 16. Must attend at least 2 classes at the Fairgrounds(April-July) to be eligible to show at the Fair.

Rally Rules and Classes

1. The exhibitor is limited to one entry per class in this division, except Rally Advanced, where two entries are allowed.
2. Dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. An exhibitor leaving the ring without the dog on a leash will have major points deducted from their score.
3. A dog who has received any Rally Novice title in any sanctioned show such as AKC (American Kennel Club) or UKC (United Kennel Club), etc., must compete in Rally Intermediate or Rally Advanced.
4. AKC guidelines and rally signs will be used as judging guidelines for these rally classes. State fair courses will not be released until the day of the show. Exhibitors are to know the signs in their appropriate class level prior to entering the class.
5. Exhibitors will walk the course without their dog prior to showing. The judge will be available at walk-throughs to answer any questions.

Rally Novice A- For dogs which have not previously competed in any rally class & are in their first year of rally training, All exercises are performed on leash. There will be between 10- 15 stations (start and finish not included) with a minimum of three and a maximum of five stationary exercises. Exhibitors are allowed to pat their legs, clap their hands or talk to encourage the dog. Exhibitors may touch their dog only for a stand exercise. AKC Rally Novice level signs will be used for this class.

Rally Novice B - For dogs which have competed in any rally class & are in their 2nd or 3rd year of rally training. Exhibitor/dog combinations are limited to 2 years in this class. All exercises are performed on leash. There will be between 10-15 stations (start and finish not included) with a minimum of three and a maximum of five stationary exercises. Exhibitors are allowed to pat their legs, clap their hands or talk to encourage the dog. Exhibitors may touch their dog only for a stand exercise. AKC Rally Novice level signs will be used for this class. Novice A course will be used.

Rally Intermediate - For dogs which have competed in any rally class and are in their 3rd year of rally training or more, or for a dog who has earned any Rally Novice title (AKC, UKC, etc). Exhibitor/dog combinations are limited to 2 years in this class. All exercises are performed on leash. There will be between 12-17 stations (start and finish not included) with a minimum of three and a maximum of seven stationary exercises. Intermediate courses will have a minimum of three Advanced level stations. There are no jumps in this class. Exhibitors are allowed to pat their legs, clap their hands or talk to encourage the dog. Exhibitors may touch their dog only for a stand exercise. AKC Rally Intermediate level signs will be used for this class.

Rally Advanced - For dogs which have competed in a rally class with 4 or more years in rally training or for a dog who has earned any Rally Intermediate title (AKC, UKC, etc.). There is no limit on the number of years an exhibitor/ dog combination can compete in this class. All exercises are performed OFF leash. There will be between 12-17 stations (start and finish not included) with a minimum of three and a maximum of seven stationary exercises. Courses will have a minimum of three advanced level stations plus one required jump. Exhibitors are allowed to pat their legs, clap their hands, or talk to encourage the dog. Exhibitors may touch their dog only for a stand exercise. AKC Advanced level signs will be used for this class.

Horse, Pony, & Mule Rules

1. **Exhibitors must check in with Superintendents in horse barn, between 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. Saturday.** Class entries will be verified at that time. Horses must be in place at 8:30am on Saturday, July 13th.
2. **Mandatory Exhibitor meeting at 10am Saturday.**
3. All animals are to be vaccinated for influenza (flu) and Encephalomyelitis (WEE, EEE). Exhibitors will deliver a Health Care Statement to certify the vaccinations form due July 1. Superintendents also strongly encourage vaccinations for strangles and rhinopneumonitis. Please check with your veterinarian.
4. Each exhibitor may show **not more than 2 animals** (mare & nursing foal will be considered as 1 animal); Mares & Foals will arrive and return home the day of show.-
5. Ages in the halter classes are determined on January 1 of the year foaled.
6. Members are to enter project in proper class by the entry deadline.
7. Superintendents have discretion to combine or divide classes.
8. Aged animals may show in only one halter class.
9. No stallions may be shown in any class except the foal classes.
10. All under 57 inches will show as ponies.
11. Ponies will be measured at the discretion of the Superintendents.
12. Previous Showmanship winners will be ineligible to compete in their respective age groups. Horse/Rider combo can only win once.
13. All exhibitors will wear BLUE JEANS, a solid, plain, long-sleeved shirt with a collar of any color including white and 4-H Arm band. Youth will receive one 4-H Arm band for free. If showing English, English attire is encouraged. **These rules apply any time exhibitor is on horseback** with the exception of speed events. Exhibitors will be allowed to wear a 4-H or FFA t-shirt during speed events.
14. **Safety helmets are required for all youth when mounted or driving.** ASTM/SEI certified helmets with chin strap and properly-fitted harness are used every time, every ride.
15. All tack, equipment, and show guidelines are contained in the Guide for 4-H Equine Shows in Iowa (available from the Extension Office).
16. **Only exhibitors and their immediate families may ride horse/pony/mule on the fairgrounds. No more than one rider per horse.** NO RIDING WITHOUT PROPER EQUIPMENT/ TACK. NO RIDING IN BARN * EXERCISE IN ARENA/ROUND PEN ONLY * NO RIDING IN ARENA AFTER 10:00 p.m.
17. Exhibitors in walk-trot or ranch horse pleasure are not eligible to show the same animal in other pleasure classes.
18. Pleasure animals will be judged under saddle. No whips or bats used except behind the saddle in any event.
19. Mules and Donkeys will not show in separate riding classes.
20. For more clarification on rules please reference the publication '4-H 0511C' *Rules and Regulation for 4-H Equine Shows*.
21. Equine Sportsmanship – this will consist of one rider paired with one of their horses. Please see superintendents for specific rules and requirements
22. Master Showmanship will only be 1st/2nd from Jr., Int., and Sr., Showmanship Classes.
23. Body Condition Score The judge and/or show committee/Vet shall examine and check for body condition of all horses brought to a show. The judge and/or show/Vet committee has the authority to excuse any horse from the class, due to a body condition score of 3 or less, at any time while being judged. This is essential regardless of whether or not the competition indicates it is necessary. The body condition score method uses sight and touch to evaluate the amount of fat over the loin, ribs, tailhead, withers, neck, and shoulders. Rabbit Showmanship

- Exhibitors competing in showmanship must show their own projects.
- Previous winners of rabbit showmanship awards are not eligible to compete again in their age groups.
- Showmanship will be divided into Three classes: Junior (grades 4-6), Intermediate (grades 7-8), and Senior (grades 9-12).

Rabbit Rules

1. All Rabbits must be checked by a Superintendent prior to being placed in their cages. Check in will be Friday 4:00pm-5:30pm. Exhibitors must be present during check in otherwise, exhibitors will be ineligible to show. Tattoos must be visible at check in.

2. All rabbits must be free from communicable disease and pass health standards. Any rabbit unhealthy or in unthrifty condition may be refused pen room. In case of arbitration, decision of appointed veterinarian shall be final.
3. All rabbits must be **permanently** earmarked by **tattoo (no ink pens)** in rabbit's left ear so there will be no question as to owner of the rabbits. Standard of perfection available in 4-H Rabbit Guide; more details on project available from project leader and Extension Office. If problem arises, decision of superintendent and Extension Staff is final.
4. All rabbits must be in exhibitor's possession and tattooed (except fryers and meat pens) by May 1.
5. An exhibitor is limited to six rabbits, except fryers/meat pen. An exhibitor is allowed two entries per class, except fryers. Each exhibitor may enter one meat pen and three single fryers. Entries must be within the age and weight limits for the class.
6. Superintendent may adjust classes according to entry numbers.
7. Top two meat pens may be sold at livestock auction
8. Rabbits will be judged on how close they come to standard of perfection. Point total if needed. Only sexually intact rabbits are eligible for show.
9. All varieties within a breed will be judged in the same class. Proof for Breed, such as papers, pedigrees, records, etc. may be requested. All rabbit entries **must** be listed with breed of rabbit on entry. Breed types are listed in 4-H Rabbit Book, ARBA Rabbit Guide, etc. If in doubt, talk to superintendents.
10. Best of Show will be picked from Best Six Class, Best Four Class, and Best Other Breeds.

3. Market lambs weighing **less than 85 pounds will show in the light weight class and are not eligible to sell in the sale.**
4. All sheep in place by 7:00 a.m. Saturday.
5. **All sexually intact sheep (ewes & ewe lambs) exhibited at County Fair, must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag.**
6. Sheep MUST be slick sheared 1 week before fair.
7. To be eligible to show, lambs must not have evidence of intact testicles at fair time.
8. Sheep exhibiting signs of active club lamb fungus and/or other contagious disease(s) will be disqualified and ineligible for show and need to be removed from the premises. A Veterinarian will make final call.
9. Coats and coverings must be off only for weigh-in
10. We strongly recommend the use of wood shavings/sawdust for bedding of pens.
11. Members should not bring prolapsed animals to the fair. Animals exhibiting evidence of prolapse while on display at the fair may be subject to disqualification and market lambs may not be eligible for sale in the auction. If your animal is exhibiting signs of prolapse, consult your veterinarian
12. Exhibitors are expected to care for their lambs in an acceptable manner. If sheep are being restrained, someone must be present at all times.
13. New Class: Yearling & Ewe Class
 - a. Yearling must have showed breeding at our fair a previous year and by the same exhibitor.
 - b. Ewe- must have an 840 tag, come to weigh-in and must be born prior to May 4th
 - c. Class will be at the end of the breeding show.

Department 62 – Breeding Sheep Breeding Sheep Rules

1. All Yearling ewes must have been born in the previous calendar year. All ewe lambs must have been born in the current calendar year.
2. 4-H'ers/FFA members may have the assistance of a 4-H'er/FFA member who meets fair age eligibility requirements in the yearling ewe class. The assistant's help will be limited to helping set hind legs.

8. Superintendents may also reassign breeding sheep to a different class, based on the entry's eligibility. For example, speckled faced ewe classes are designed for entries showing evidence of cross breeding.
9. Sheep will be observed at weigh-in and entry check-in for overall health. Therefore, no blankets or other coverings will be permitted on lambs at weigh-in. Sheep exhibiting signs of club lamb fungus and/or other contagious disease(s) will be disqualified and ineligible for show and need to be removed from the premises.

1. Will be shown on Tuesday @ 1 p.m.
2. Interviews will take place starting at 9 a.m. on Tuesday.
3. The project is open to 4-H & FFA exhibitors of all ages enrolled in a beef or dairy project. Calf must be bucket or bottle-fed, no nursing permitted.
4. Calves may be dairy, beef, crossbred, straightbred, either sex, but must be: a) born after Jan. 1 and b) identified by tag or tattoo and in the exhibitor's possession by May 1.
5. An exhibitor may identify up to 3 calves but will show only 2 at the fair.
6. Calves are to stay the whole fair.
7. Calves MAY NOT be shown in other classes.
8. Classes will be divided into two exhibitor age groups - (a) Grades 4-6 and (b) Grades 7-12 and further classification at the discretion of the superintendents.
9. Calves will be shown at halter and no show sticks.
10. Judging will be on what the individual has learned about care, feeding, grooming and showing of calf, according to either beef or dairy guidelines and the general health and conformation of the calf and the completed record sheet. Judging will be based 60% on Interview and 40% on show ring.
11. Bucket Calf Plus One calves are eligible for the livestock auction if make 1200 lbs.
12. Bucket Calf Plus One calves must have shown as a bucket-bottle calf the previous year.

Breeding Sheep Rules

1. Will be shown on Tuesday after the Bottle Calf Show.
2. Interviews will take place starting at 8 a.m. on Tuesday
3. Lambs and kids must be bucket or bottle-fed, no nursing is permitted.
4. Lambs and kids may be dairy, meat, or wool/hair varieties, crossbred or straightbred, either sex but must be: a) born after Jan. 1 and b) identified by a tag or tattoo; all sexually intact goats and sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag c) project animal must be in the exhibitors care by May 1.
5. An exhibitor may identify up to 3 animals but will only show 2 at the fair. Lambs and kids shown in these classes MAY NOT be shown in other classes.
6. Bottle Lamb/Kids will stay the whole fair.
7. Classes will be divided into two exhibitor age groups - (a) Grades 4-6 and (b) Grades 7-10 and further classification at the discretion of the superintendent.
8. Lambs and kids may be shown at halter

Judging will be on what the individual has learned about care, feeding, grooming and showing of lambs or goats, and the general health and confirmation of the animal and the completed record sheet. Judging will be based 60% on interview and 40% on show ring.

Showmanship

- **Showmanship classes are voluntary for all exhibitors except previous winners of each age group.**
- Previous winners of swine showmanship awards are not eligible to compete again in their age groups.
- Exhibitors must show their own project.
- Showmanship will be divided into three classes: Senior, Grades 9-12; Intermediate, Grades 7-8; Junior, Grades 4-6

Swine Rules

- 1) All pigs must be in place by 5:30 p.m. Friday, with ear notch check-in following.
 - Health Papers are required if you come between 8am-3pm on Friday, July 11th.
 - If you come between 6am-8am or 3pm-5:30pm on Friday, July 11th no health papers are required but all swine must be checked by vet **BEFORE** getting off trailer.
- 2) ALL hogs will have a 4-H or FFA eartag prior to arrival on the fairgrounds.
- 3) Weigh-in will be Sunday at 6:00 a.m -7:00am.
- 4) No wet hogs at weigh-in. No re-weighs.
- 5) Class sheets must be turned in at weigh-in at Fair.
- 6) **All non-sale pigs MUST be removed from the barn on Wednesday evening after 8 p.m.**
- 7) A maximum of 12 pigs may be identified (Universal ear-notch system) 4H Online by May 15th. Pigs will be checked at weigh-in for proper identification.
- 8) **All exhibitors must have YQCA Certification and Premise ID number.**
- 9) No pseudorabies (PRV) testing is required for county fair. Vaccination for PRV and erysipelas is recommended. **All pigs returning home are subject to rule # 6 of the Health Requirements.**

- 10) Entries are open to straight-bred or crossbred pigs, either barrows or gilts for market, farrowed after December 1, of the current year, and notched by the Universal Ear Notching System. **Those not properly ear-notched will not be eligible for exhibit.**
- 11) **For all purebred market and breeding swine:** Registration papers must be in the 4-H'ers name OR show a logical family relationship. Member must have papers in hand at check-in. Litter registrations will be accepted. All purebred pigs must meet the breed registry requirements.
- 12) There shall be no coloring agents, and/or powder used on hogs. The use of either is strictly prohibited. Pigs in violation will not be allowed to show.
- 13) Due to packer demands and concerns, the pigs hair shall not be shorter than ½ inch.
- 14) Minimum weight at the Fair weigh-in for all pigs is 220 lbs and maximum is 310 lbs. Pigs weighing less than 220 lbs or more than 310 lbs can still be shown. They are NOT eligible for the sale or for the championship drive.
- 15) The Breeding Gilt may show in the Breeding Gilt class **AND** in a Pen-of-Three. She may NOT, however, show as a Market Individual.
- 16) Each exhibitor be allowed to exhibit no more than 4 pigs. This means NO extra pigs.
- 17) Individuals, Pens of Three, and Breeding Gilts will be weighed and divided into classes as designated by superintendents.
- 18) No clean-up of pens until all animals are loaded out
- 19) County Raised from each class.
- 20) Market Pigs will be split into Market Gilts and Market Barrows.
- 21) 1st year members will complete an interview during fair to be considered for 1st year swine showman.

SHOWRING CODE OF ETHICS

As developed by the INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of Ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect

- appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect. No person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.
